STREET HOCKEY CENTER OPENS . . . players' dream come true.

The American Street Hockey Institute is proud to announce the opening of a new multi-purpose Street Hockey Center in Leominster, Moss.

The Center will be a Street Hockey player's dream come true. Occupying over seven acres of prime commercial land adjacent to Route 2, a major highway to Boston, the Center will have two regulation Street Hockey rinks and a modern two-story Clubhouse complete with locker rooms, pro shop and instructional meeting rooms for the training of coaches, referees and game officials.

The playing rinks will be 80 feet wide, by 155 feet long with 4 foot high boards. The special surface will be marked with center and clearing lines, goal creases and face-off circles.

The rink is complete with ployer's benches, penalty-timekeeper's box, lights and an electronic scoreboard. The Center will open with one rink in April, 1974 with the second to be constructed in July, 1974.

The ploying facilities will be commercially operated and the management will assist in the formation of organized teams and leagues. All games will be ployed under official A.S.H.I. rules, complete with trained referees, linesmen and penalty-time-keepers. The facilities will be open doily and leagues will play ten, twelve or fifteen game schedules. The Center plans to start the first season with five leagues - Seniors 'A' (20 years and older with checking), Seniors 'B' (20 years and older with

NO checking), Freshmen (16-19), Codets (13-15), and Bontoms (10-12). The number of teams in each league will depend upon the registrations for each division.

The Center will also be used for notional and international tournaments and the site was selected with the convenience of visiting teams in mind. Directly across the highway is a major shopping center complete with motels, restaurants, movies and other recreational facilities.

A.S.H.I.'s new Center will be the model for other street hockey Centers throughout the U.S. and Canada. The Institute plans to be instrumental in having these centers built in order to meet the demands of this rapidly growing sport.

AMERICAN STREET HOCKEY CENTER

1974-1984

After 4 years (1970-74) of experimenting with playing rules, various size rinks, and equipment, the American Street Hockey Center opened. The design was a culmination of several individuals' thoughts and ideas under the direction of Raymond W. Leclerc, considered to be the principal architect of the Center and the sport as it is known today.

The original objective was to build a model facility not only for the local community but for others to imitate. Since 1974, many more rinks have been built both private and public.

We are proud to have been the host to 10 consecutive years of National Championships in 5 age groups with over 12,000 participants. The American Street Hockey Center will continue to serve as the Headquarters for Street Hockey/Dekhockey activity for the forseeable future.





RULES AND REGULATIONS



Q. HOW DID THE A.S.H.I. RULES AND REGULATIONS COME ABOUT?

A. Before adopting the present rules, the A.S.H.I. spent five years experimenting with different size rinks, various zone changes, alternate offside-clearing-goal line positions, and penalty infractions. After being thoroughly tested under organized league play at all age levels they were officially adopted in their present form.

Q. DO THE RULES EVER CHANGE?

A. Basically no, however there is an annual Rules Revision Conference held once a year when additions or alterations may be adopted.

Q. WHY DIDN'T THE A.S.H.I. SIMPLY ADOPT ICE HOCKEY RULES?

A. Originally we did, however we soon found that running is not like skating, asphalt is not ice and a ball is not a puck, therefore alterations were made to compensate for these differences without losing the basic flavor of hockey.

Q. WHY NOT ALLOW STICKS WITH WOODEN BLADES?

A. Two reasons: 1.) Safety - Wooden blades used on hard surfaces become splintered easily and can cause serious injuries. 2.) Because a street hockey ball weighs only 1-3/4 ounces, (a puck weighs 6 ounces), hard slap shots taken with a wooden blade causes the ball to travel at a very high speed thereby causing the ball to dip, curve and swerve in an inconsistent pattern which makes it unreasonably difficult for a goaltender to defend. ("Spitballs" are not allowed in baseball because they are unfair to the batter - same as a "lively" baseball would be unfair to a pitcher.) Wooden blades are designed for a puck on ice - Plastic blades are designed for a ball on a hard surface.

Q. WHY "NO BODY CHECKING"?

A. Orignally body checking was allowed and injuries were a frequent occurrence. In 1974 the A.S.H.I. decided to test adult league games without body checking. A poll of participants was taken midway through and at the end of the season. 94% of the players, coaches and officials urged that the Institute officially adopt a no body checking rule. The reason given was that it makes for a better game with much less chance of injury. Also it became obvious that body checking was not necessary to defend against an oncoming player. In two steps, players can be moving as fast as their opponent. In ice hockey, body checking serves a purpose because of the build-up of speed with skates. Again,

Q. WHY "NO BODY CHECKING"? (continued)

through testing, it became obvious that running is not like skating and asphalt is not like ice. All leagues known to the Institute who adopt the "no checking" rule have agreed it makes for a much better game and greatly reduces hostility between players with resulting altercations and injuries.

Q. DOES NO BODY CHECKING MEAN NO BODY CONTACT?

A. No. The No Body Checking rule reads, "A player may not use his body to BUMP an opponent out of position by using his shoulder or hips." A player may, however, 'stand his own ground', jockey for position (as in front of the goal), cut in front of an opponent in pursuit of the ball, lean against an opponent while 'digging' for the ball along the boards, etc. There is ample and sufficient body contact under the rules without the intentional body checking (BUMPING) commonly used in ice hockey.


Q. DO THE RULES SPECIFICALLY MAKE PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT MANDATORY?

A. YES, for the player's safety and to protect his clothing. Falling on a hard dry surface is not like falling on ice and being hit by a stick causes bruises and injuries in both street and ice hockey. Requirements vary in accordance with different age groups. Leagues generally outline requirements before each season and before each tournament.

Q. WHERE CAN I GET THE LATEST OFFICIAL RULE BOOK?

A. The A.S.H.I. and hockey pro shops have these for \$3.50 each (76 pages)

The American Street Hockey Institute does not adopt any rules until they have been thoroughly tested in actual league competition played in a regulation rink.




